Although Nellie Ascough was 98 when she died it didn't seem to have seriously occurred to anyone that she wouldn't make it to 100. She had certainly become more frail physically, but in spirit she could have been a much younger woman. She was full of determination, had an ongoing interest in everyday life, and a cracking sense of humour. And she was a great supporter of the local bus service and Greggs the bakers.

However, on Sunday February 18, Nellie had just enjoyed her usual breakfast of a bacon sandwich, when she suddenly collapsed and died in the kitchen with her son-in-law, Chris, nearby. As fitting an end as she would have wished, blighted tragically by the loss of her only daughter, Rose, just five days previously.

Nellie was very happy in her cottage Front Street and took great pride in it. She had lived at Hill House for over 70 years and, although she wasn't born in Topcliffe, she was very much part of the village and had a great sense of belonging. She would not have wanted to go into a care home she was far too independent

for that - and besides, she had a team of friends and neighbours who took excellent care of her and she knew she was valued and loved by the community.

Even in her more fragile final weeks, Nellie would still be going out, whether it was to the Post Office for her pension, or catching the bus into Thirsk when her favourite taxi driver would always bring her home safely.

Tuesday afternoon Boccia provides gentle exercise and socialising for senior citizens in the village hall. Nellie was an impressively good player and proud that she was a valuable member of her team. She enjoyed the

conversation about local news, and the tea and cake at the interval. She famously loved her food.

Sunday was Nellie's special day when Rose, Chris, her granddaughters, Emma and Helen, and very new greatgrandson, Jack, would visit. She would have already enjoyed lunch from The Swan courtesy of landlord George, and later she would happily provide tea for her family.

Nellie is greatly missed of course but she had a contented life and didn't seem to want or need anything more. Perhaps that's the secret of a long and happy life, that and the help and affection of thoughtful friends and neighbours. She didn't believe in going to funerals and indeed, had perhaps reached the stage of thinking that "death is nothing at all" and that she would be "only slipping away into the next room." Certainly, it's hard to believe that we won't see her making her way to the bus-stop in her nice bright orange coat ever again.


Sowing The Seeds Of Success

On a bright Sunday morning in late February, Dave dropped the 160 feet from the top the impressive structure and in doing so, raised just short of £500 to help pay for local scouts to join the 24th World Scout Jamboree the in

American state of West Virginia in 2019.

The Jamboree is held every four years and is the pinnacle global scouting event camp which is organised by World Scout the Organisation. In 2019 the USA, Canada and Mexico will be ioint hosts and it's anticipated that the event will be the biggest of its kind ever staged.

Topcliffe's scout group is one of 36 units from North Yorkshire and Durham who will be sending scouts to the Jamboree, and they'll be representing the UK as a whole.

Dave and his colleague scouts will be organising many more fundraising events in the coming months and they hope that Topcliffe and Asenby residents might offer them some support.

Roadworks Underway

North Yorkshire County Council has contracted with Tarmac to carry out a range of roadworks on the A167 and in and around Topcliffe.

The works, which are now underway, consists of six main elements and the aim is to improve the safety of road users along the A167 by refreshing signs, laying new road markings, improving the surfacing through Topcliffe village and increasing the super elevation on the bend near Maddison 4x4 business.

The six elements are:

- 1. Topcliffe village: Resurface and replace/renew gully gratings/frames and service covers. Reset other ironworks. Reinstate road studs and reinstate/refresh road markings.
- 2. Signing: Signing works to take place at Busby Stoop roundabout, bend near Maddison 4x4 business, both sides of Catton Moor Lane, north of Topcliffe, adjacent Alanbrooke Barracks and in Topcliffe village. This will include directional signage, chevrons and warning signs.
- 3. Road markings: Centre line markings, 'SLOW' markings on the A61 Carlton road and the A167 Station Road on the approaches to Busby Stoop roundabout and a new 30mph speed roundal at the gateway on the north side of Topcliffe.
- 4. Alanbrooke Barracks entrance area: Installation of tactile crossings on dropped crossings both sides of the carriageway north of the barrack entrance, removal of existing kerbs to tip and replace with bus kerbs, (on both bus stops), reprofiling of footway at new bus kerbs, resurfacing existing footway both sides of the entrance to the barracks and on the opposite side, extension of hardstanding at northern shelter, installation of pedestrian refuge at northern bus shelter, installation of ghost island south of the southern bus shelter (to protect right hand turn lane) and provision of pedestrian friendly grating and frame.
- 5. Super elevation: Improvements to the super elevation north of Maddison 4x4 business resurfacing, lining and signage works.
- 6. Drainage: Drainage grips to be installed at various locations along the A167 and clearing out of the existing ditch.

Village Hall Committee Update

Here's a summary of matters discussed at the village hall meeting in January.

- New planting boxes, kindly constructed by Malcolm Morley, have been installed at the front of the village hall.
- A range of local companies have made donations towards the cost of constructing an entrance canopy on the village hall Cargills Premix & Nutrition £150; Cleveland Steel £500; Wagg Foods £250; Cod Beck Blenders £200; Severfield £250 and Frontier Agricultural £500. The committee warmly thanked these companies for their generosity and support.
- Quotations will be sought from local businesses for the construction of the canopy, though the project can only proceed when sufficient funds have been raised.
- It was agreed that the first Scarecrow Festival in our two villages will go ahead in 2018. Plans will be developed over the next month or two so that plenty of notice can be given to residents who we are sure will enthusiastically support the event.
- The training and information session held in January to explain how the defibrillator installed at the Doctor's Surgery works, was a great success with over 60 people attending. A request for a basic First Aid training course to be held is being actively pursued.
- The pensioners' Christmas lunch was a great success and the third Sunday Brunch, held on 25 February was again well attended and raised nearly £200 for village hall funds.
- Among the events coming up are a Horse Race Night on Saturday 14 April and a social night (barn dance and supper) on Saturday 21 April to celebrate St. George's Day. Tickets for both evenings are now on sale
- Plans for a Blues Night, Magic Circle Night and an autumn dance are being considered. Watch out for more details.




